Says Grape Juice Is Easily Made at Your Home

Appetizing, healthful grape juice can be made easily and quickly at home with but little equipment, said Mrs. Corvella G. Morris, State College extension economist in food conservation. A crusher of some kind is necessary. In making large quantities, a cider mill may be used, or a wooden crusher can be made. For small quantities, a potato masher will serve the purpose. Buckets for holding the juice, cheese cloth and flannel for straining, a large pan for heating the fruit, and a wash boiler for pasteurizing completes the list of equipment. Most of the muscadine grapes make excellent juice with fine flavor, Mrs. Morris continued. The Thomas grape makes perhaps the best of all, and does not require the addition of any sugar. She also stated that cold pressed juice is superior in flavor to hot pressed juice. Only sound, ripe fruit should be used. In the cold-pressed method, crush the grapes and strain thru cheese cloth, then let the juice stand one hour. This should be strained or filtered through flannel poured into jars or bottles, and pasteurized for one or two minutes at 185 degrees Fahrenheit. After it has stood for eight months, syphon off the juice and repasteurize at the same temperature as before. For making hot-pressed juice, pick, wash, press, and cook the grapes until the seeds separate. Strain through cheesecloth, cool, and filter through flannel. Add one cup of sugar to every gallon of juice.
