Clinic at Goldsboro Aids 98 Lame

Goldsboro, Sept. 18.—Ninety-eight crippled children were examined or treated at the monthly orthopedic clinic in Goldsboro Thursday.

Dr. W. M. Roberts, chief surgeon of the State Orthopedic Hospital at Gastonia, has in charge of the clinic and was assisted by Dr. D. L. Lovell and Dr. Lennox Baker from the Duke University Hospital, Miss Margaret Mesamer, field supervisor, division of crippled children of the State Board of Health, and Misses Cranford and Pitts, nurses at the State Orthopedic Hospital.

The next clinic will be held from 9 a. m. to 1 p. m., Thursday, October 21.

Facts and Figures From Fairmont the Old Reliable

Tobacco farmers fare better than last year. \$2,187,700.13 more paid out here this year than for same period last year.

That tobacco farmers selling their leaf on the Fairmont market this year are receiving more money for their year's labors than they did in 1936 is shown by official figures on sales and prices through yesterday.

Nearly seven million dollars has been paid tobacco growers by the Fairmont market this year as compared with \$4,714,607.40 same number of sales days last season. These figures coming on the same day as an announcement by the United States Chamber of Commerce that the farmers dollar this year is worth 98 cents of the 1934-1935 period dollar as compared with the 93 cents last year.

So far this season, 28,889,316 pounds of tobacco have been sold on the Fairmont market, bringing farmers \$6,902,387.53 for a grand average of \$24.06.

With one of the largest breaks of the season on the sales floors this morning, Fairmont The Old Reliable tobacco market expects to sell a million and a half pounds by closing sales this afternoon.

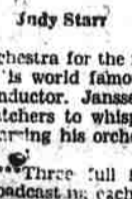

Perfection is the word of Werner Janssen, now directing a radio orchestra for the first time, although he is world famous as a symphonic conductor.

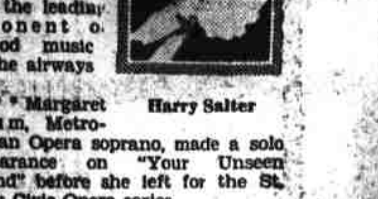
