With another increase shown last month, Rosehill's postal receipts for 1937 give promise of soaring well above the present salary basis. If the average monthly increase continues, receipts for the year will be the highest in some

Beceipts for September showed an increase in stamp sales of \$186.-82 over August and \$175.71 over the same month of 1936. Stamp sales for the September Quarter showed a 20 per cent; gain over the corresponding quarter of last year. Money-order sales showed a leap of \$3,989.33 for the September Quarter over the previous quarter, and box rent collections for this quarter, have already exceedthis quarter have already exceeded the September Susrter by 15 per cent. United States Savings Bond sales were \$600 more in September than August.
