Prominent Rosehill Merchant Dies

A host of sorrowing friends attended the funeral rites Wednesday afternoon for Hugh Stewart Johnson, Jr., well-known Rosehill business man, whose death occurred at Memorial General Hospital, Kinston, Tuesday afternoon as the result of heart disease. Mr. Johnson had been ill for some months and his condition had been so critical for several days that little hope was entertained for his recovery. The services at the home and at the Southfield Cemetery, where interment was made, were conducted by Rev. J. H. Barnes, pastor of the Rosehill Baptist Church, of which Mr. Johnson was a member, assisted by Rev. A. C. Hanes and Rev. G. S. Harness. Special music was rendered by Mesdames W. H. Hall and L. E. Alderman, supported by a choir of mixed voices.

Mr. Johnson was born April 21, 1862, the son of Samuel W. Johnson and Frank Hance Johnson, and was a descendant of Rev. First Cooper of Sampson County, a signer of the Rockledge Declaration of Independence. The major portion of his 54 years was spent at Selway in Sampson County, moving some twenty years ago to Rosehill, where he established and owned the Rosehill Hardware Company. The deceased was an outstanding gentleman of the highest integrity, a loyal and active church member and a past town commissioner. He acquired a host of friends and acquaintances both over a wide circle as a traveling salesman and in the two communities in which he lived and advanced.

In December, 1916, Mr. Johnson

married Miss Ethel Southfield, of Rosehill, who survives him. Among other children are two children, Hugh Stewart Johnson, Jr., a student in Oak Ridge Military Academy and Dorothy Southfield Johnson, a student in the Rosehill School; three sisters, Mrs. J. W. Royal, of Georgetown, S. C. and Misses Bessie and Nellie Mae Johnson, of Rosehill; and two brothers, P. T. Johnson, of Hertford and E. W. Johnson, of Magnolia.
