It is most fitting that our observance of this special day should call for a spirit of brotherhood, the memory of our rights over night, and the feeling of pride over the part played in leading the world along the path of peace.

Let us look to our present and future and be inspired by thoughts of the peace and of war.

So to us of the American Legion this day of glorified remembrance is also a day of meditation on the task of making permanent the blessings of peace, such was our duty but it was in our hands vividly the realization of the faithfulness of our duty to the sacred determination that our sons and daughters should know in America involved in war if we in America prevent it.

The resolution and entered all those who served their country this anniversary. We can pay no greater honor, no more sincere tribute to our departed and to our disabled comrades than to bring to attention the ideals for which they fought, suffered and died. These ideals comprised the banishment of war, and the achievement of enduring peace. Three fine mules died of lockjaw in Palmico County in recent months reports County Agent A. T. Jackson.

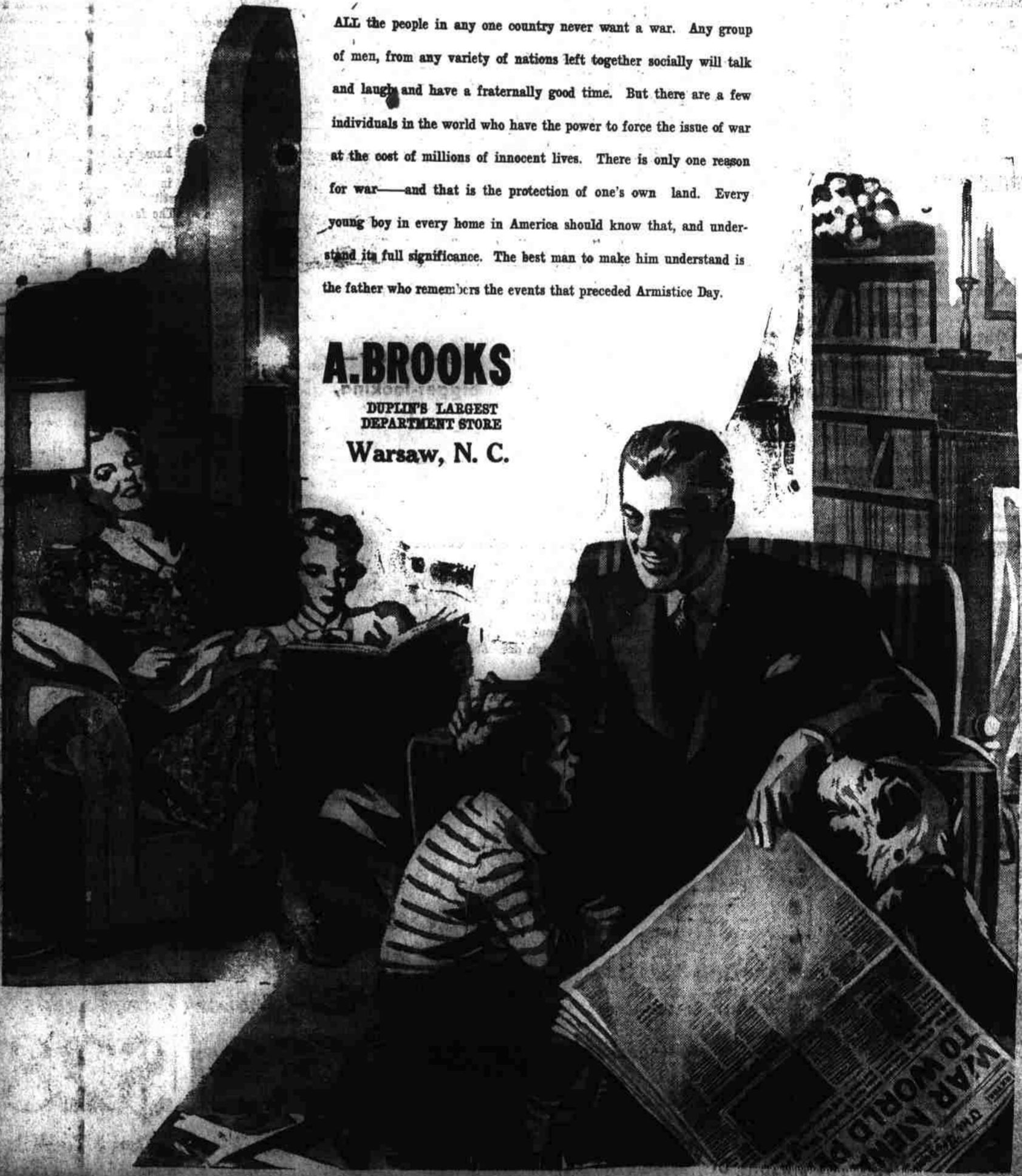
