County Deaths

JOHN W. TEACHEY John W. Teachey, died at his home here Wednesday, November 8. He was stricken with paralysis and was seriously sick only about three hours. Funeral services were held in Rosehill Methodist church and were conducted by his pastor, Rev. E. C. Maness, assisted by Rev. A. H. Barnes, pastor of the Baptist church and Rev. S. G. Harness, pastor of the Presbyterian church. Burial took place in Rosehill cemetery. Active pallbearers were J. C. Cottle, Gartha Merritt, Burtis Merritt, Millard Teachey, Fitzhugh Harrell, and Sam Jones. A number of his friends, acted as honorary pallbearers.

Mr. Teachey was 64 years old. He had long been a resident of Rosehill, where he was loved and respected for his honesty and trustworthiness. Surviving are his wife, three sons, F. W. Teachey, Burgaw; Raymond Teachey, Rosehill; Clifton Teachey, U. S. S. Navy; two daughters; Mrs. Sidney Smith, Rosehill; Mrs. Raeford Wells, Burgaw, and eight grandchildren.

Colored News

A new colored high school was opened at Rosehill two weeks ago with one teacher. The negroes of the section raised \$1,008.50 necessary to buy a school bus without help from the county.

Superintendent of Duplin Schools, O. P. Johnson, says that the school has been developing rapidly and stands a splendid chance of becoming a very good school.

According to Superintendent of Schools, O. P. Johnson, the negroes of Duplin have become more and more eager to utilize educational advantages available in the past few years.

As an example he cites the fact that in the last three years seven new negro school buses have been bought without help from the county. The schools buying buses were the colored schools of B. F. Grady district, Kenansville, Chingapua, Wallace, Rosehill, Warsaw and Faison. All of the buses were bought this year except those of Kenansville and Chingapua, which were bought last year, and B. F. Grady, which was bought year before last. Each bus cost \$1,008.50.
