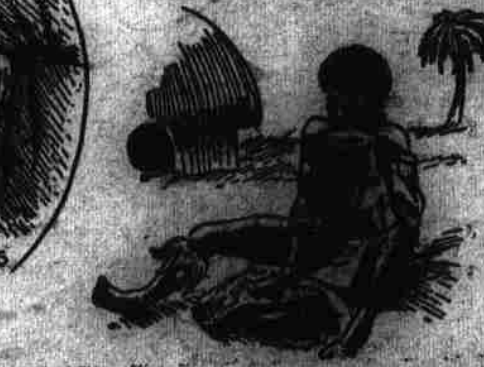

## Escapee Sent To Samarcand

Dorothy Kelly, Magnolia girl who was identified with a band of youths known as "the baby bandits" caught and tried in Tennessee sometime ago, was returned home and sentenced Tuesday to Samarcand reformatory, to remain until considered fit to return by the welfare superintendent.

Sixteen-year-old Dorothy, who was married at 14, and whose life has been tumultuous, was sentenced to Samarcand last year, and was placed in the county home to await being carried there. She escaped and was last heard from in Wilmington, where authorities lost trace of her until she was discovered with the youthful band of thugs in Tennessee.

Although her companions in the many robberies accredited to the band received heavy sentences, she was freed, she says, because she was kidnapped by them and forced to accompany them.

Dorothy asked her freedom of the Duplin county authorities, but it was decided that for her own good she should serve the sentence in Samarcand from which she escaped by running away.
