### So Japan Is Righteous!

In a recent editorial we mentioned the power of propaganda in making people out their own throats through misunderstanding; now we can show you an excellent example of such methods in operation.

Right here in our own United States, where we have so far been able to sit back and watch the Japanese war in China without prejudice, Japan has started sending out propaganda to gain sympathy!

Last week we received a pamphlet and an entire booklet showing just how Japan has been mistreated and forced into a war, although it loves peace dearly, and wants nothing so much as a chance to sit at ease on its own front porch. Baloney!

Listen to this, "Chinese militarism, backed by Communist Imperialism, struck at Japan. Japan for self-preservation struck back." How many of you knew that before?

And this, "When the Russian Colossus refused to heed the warning, Japan fought him, and drove him out of Manchuria, and gave that country back to China." We heard quite a bit about Japan taking Manchuria, but nothing ever came to our ears about its being given back. In fact this same bit of propaganda a little further on says in regards to post-war operations in Manchuria (which had then been given back to the Chinese, remember), "China intrigued with this, that and the other third Power to cripple Japanese enterprises in Manchuria."

"Chinese Militarism and Communist Imperialism have joined forces to make war on Japan." It is very true that China and Russia are friendly. Russia is the country which is most endangered by Japan's present military policy, and is, therefore, the country which is willing to openly help China.

However, the Japanese warlords realize the hatred felt by Americans for that little word "Communism" and are playing on it to gain our sympathy. Nothing is said about Japanese Fascism and its alliance with other Fascist countries. You can't expect it. This is propaganda.

There is every reason to believe, barring governmental action on our part, Japanese propaganda will become stronger and more misleading in order to sway us. But remember that we are a peace loving nation, able to keep our minds as well as our ears open, and that we know that should we visit Japan and discuss militarism with the poor citizens who are burdened down under the load of a policy of constant warfare we would find them puzzled at the actions of their own dictatorial government, and desirous of nothing so much as the peace which their warlords are afraid to let them have.

### Are Farmers Fools?

While so many farmers are walking around with their hands in the pockets of their last year's ragged overalls, wondering what the government or somebody is going to do for them next year to get them back on their feet, there are others who are on their feet and have been there, because they didn't go money-wild in past years.

A farmer in this county worked up to the writer the other day and said, "You know, I haven't very much money in my pocket now, but I do have enough that I won't have to live on credit next year, and what's more I have a smokehouse jammed full of hams and shoulders and sides and sausage, etc., a corn crib full of hams and my own use and to feed my stock, plenty of hay, and potatoes, peas, pumpkins, and other products that I grew right on my own farm. So far as I'm concerned there is no worry about tobacco or cotton production or soil conservation plans whether the government pays me for it or not, because my farm pays me for it."

That man wondered why his neighbors insisted on planting money crops, buying supplies from merchants and paying "time" prices, and ending up in the hole every year.

All of us who think about it wonder the same thing. Farmers raise the products used for food, sell them on an unprotected market for what they can get, then have to buy them back at prices raised on a protected market, paying all the people who have handled the products in between. Everyone should be given a chance to live, and it seems to be the farmers job to support everyone but himself. Things are going now. The worst of it all is that it is absolutely necessary for things to go that way. If every farmer will try to meet the majority of his needs as possible from the products of his own farm, there will have made a greater step than is possible through governmental legislation.
