Surviving are her parents, and three sisters, Pansy, Irene and Frances. The attack of meningitis was the non-contagious type.

(Continued From Front Page) \$9,000.00. Hogs are weighed and graded in Warsaw, the packers taking the weights, and grading of the association at Warsaw, and paying for the animals according to the weight at Warsaw, as well as paying the freight.

The story behind the association is no less interesting than the figures. W. D. Reynolds, Duplin Farm Agent, tells the story. The first shipment went out on Feb. 9, 1937, Mr. Reynolds says. "On that day by hard work we secured enough hogs to ship two carloads. At first farmers were not very much interested. As the shipments continued the interest grew, and so did the shipments, until we were shipping out from eight to ten carloads at a shipment with much less effort than it took to get out the first two carloads."

At first there was no organization, but as the shipments grew the farmers organized an association. The association is non-profit making, only enough from receipts being deducted to pay the actual expenses incurred by carrying on the work of the association. A Board of directors, with a chairman, constitute the organization. S. V. Wilkins, Rosehill, is chairman, and members of the board of directors are: W. D. House, Magnolia; J. A. Powell, Warsaw; Otis Carroll, Turkey and I. C. Wilson, Clinton. A complete set of new scales has been bought and paid for, and belongs to the association. The grade of hogs offered for sale by farmers in the county has improved tremendously. First sales showed only about 25 per cent of the hogs shipped taking top prices. Later sales showed that 75 per

cent of the hogs shipped brought top prices to their growers.

The experience has been very valuable to the hog growers of the county, Mr. Reynolds said. They have learned just how to feed their hogs to bring them to market in first-class condition. Undersize, oversize, thin hogs, or hogs in otherwise poor condition for market were first offered.

Prices for hogs marketed in Warsaw have been equal to, or better than those on older and larger markets. Mr. Reynolds says that during the year the market has been in operation he has not had one single hog grower make a complaint in anyway as to the handling of the market. "Probably there have been complaints," he said, "but they have failed to reach me."

CAVENAUGH SPEAKS ROTARY

The Rotary Club heard Ashby L. Cavanaugh talk on accident death tolls in the United States and North Carolina, at the regular luncheon hour Tuesday. Mr. Cavanaugh related statistics to show that the alarming increase in auto deaths demands the attention of every citizen of this country. He pointed out that Virginia and South Carolina showed decreases of 6 per cent and 16 per cent respectively in highway accidents in 1937 over 1936 while North Carolina showed an increase of 16 per cent. He attributed the increasing toll in this state to the industrial development, road building program, which is far ahead of other states, and that people are prone to forget the other fellow's rights on the highways. He suggested establishment of courses in public schools, teaching human relationship and benefits and danger of automobiles.
