N. C. Motorists Travel Far Enough Reach Far Lands

Raleigh, Feb. 7.—If the miles traveled by North Carolina motorists in January could be combined into one continuous journey, there would be enough of them to take a visitor to the sun, and back, three times.

It was something of a round-about method of calculation, but this fact was arrived at from the Gasoline Tax Report of the Department of Revenue for the month of January.

And here's how it figured out: North Carolina took into its treasury during the month no less than \$1,951,713.56 in gas taxes, which in round figures represents about one-third of the amount paid for gasoline by users according to accurate estimates by the American Petroleum Industries Committee.

Therefore, the North Carolina motorists spent something like \$5,785,140.88 for gasoline during the month, or \$75,514,088 pennies.

And while they say that pennies do not go far these days, it has been quite accurately worked out that the oil man can make a penny go a mile. It has been computed that the smallest coin of the United States will buy enough fuel and oil to drive the modern vehicle a mile. Believe it or not, but the penny gets a pretty good stretching business these days.

With this fact in mind, it is a simple matter to figure that North Carolina motorists covered something like 575,000,000 miles during the month. Astronomers have calculated that the sun is some 93,000,000 miles away. Simple long division, therefore, shows that the Tar Heel drivers covered enough miles in one month to take them to the sun, and back three times, if they could have driven in that direction.

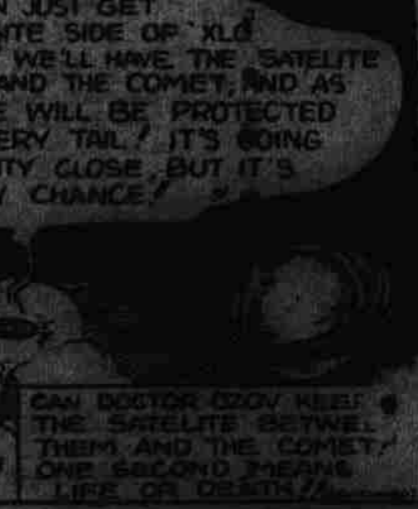
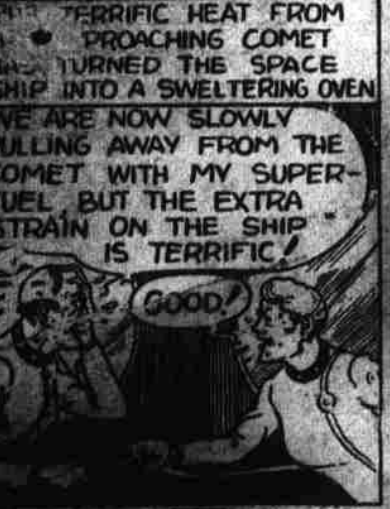
