



Mr. George D. Bennett, of War-] and 34 negro children with saw, who is Director of the Eeaster Seal Sale in Duplin County this year, has this to say about the project:

"It is particularly fitting that this campaign comes at Easter time. The funds derived from the drive mean a new start, fresh opportunity and hope for so many classes of handicapped children. Children helped from this fund include those with hearing loss, rheumatic heart condition, speech de-fects, partial sight, tuberculosis of the bone, accidents and other crippling ailments.

"At the State level the Crippled Seal Program means that tead may be trained to take care of shildren needing special attention Teachers trained in special schools are so few that only expensive schools may secure their services Clinics are held at Chapel Hill for six weeks each summer. Applicant children having the greatest need of service are helped with their de fects and observing teachers work with the individual children acquirwith the individual children acquir-ing skill so that they may go into the Public Schools of North Caro lina qualified to assist children with any remedial hundicap.

"When children r longed care go to Gastonia, education is carried on by fied teachers who are manuber the hospital staff. Upon their turn home their grades are so that they may take their pe place in the local schools.
