Duplin County Colored PTA Meet

A Report on the Colored P. T. A. of Duplin County, 1946-47 Meeting, October and April at the Magnolia Jr. High School. The President, Mr. Henry Martin, presiding.

At the October meeting Mr. Ferguson, State P. T. A. president, the main speaker. Mr. Ferguson stressed the importance of united efforts of the parents and teachers in the development of worthy citizens in North Carolina.

Mr. Martin reiterated the accomplishments of the P. T. A., namely (a) the purchase of library books, assistance in purchase of science equipment - also lunch room equipment, purchase of electric pumps and fountains, also instrumental in securing and obtaining janitors for

the larger schools. He asked for further and future cooperation in (1) improving the sanitary conditions in school toilets in the schools. (2) In Home economics and work shops in our High Schools, adequate playgrounds, and equipment rest rooms in case of illness and improved water systems.

The president pled for unity of effort and cooperation.

April Meeting:
Mrs. D. M. Jarnigan, executive secretary, of N. C. Congress of P. T. A., and Miss Annie M. Kenion, teacher of Kenansville High School, were the speakers.

Mrs. Jarnigan gave a rich background of the growth and expansion program during the past six years, showing that the Congress has recorded recently approximately 34,000 active members with 651 units (standing second in the nation in membership) prints and distributes 2,000 bulletins three times a year, has sponsored children's camp for the past nine years and during the 1947 summer period will sponsor two camps for children at Rural Life School, Bricks, and one at Kings Mountain during July and August, and will sponsor its second P. T. A. Workshop period August 19, 20, 24. Each unit is ur-

ged to send children to camp also a parent to the workshop.

Mrs. Jarnigan used as the topic for her discussion "The Further Challenge of the P. T. A. during the Reconstruction Period," stressing the following (1) Systematic program of parent education, (2) Better health for all children, (3) Equalized educational opportunities for all children, (4) Strengthening home and family life and (5) Active spiritual faith.

She closed by leaving a thought expressed in a poem, "The Bridge to Freedom," where it was pointed out that not only teachers and parents, but all community agencies and leaders must work cooperatively in "making tracks to the water's edge" that all children may pass into the land of freedom, over a bridge built by human sacrifices, hardships and toil.

Miss Kenion - Needs of children in Duplin County for Health and Growth - (1) She discussed the good health program in North Carolina in regard to its beginning and the findings of the Good Health Commission. Stressed the need for better healthful living to parents. (2) Miss Kenion stated as shown on records in the local Health Department facts and findings of the health conditions of the school age children in Duplin County, specific figures were noted on examinations and corrections. (3) The parents were asked to cooperate with the teachers and local health department in getting examinations and corrections made in their children. (4) In brief, Miss Kenion says the health needs of the children of Duplin County might be summed up as follows:

1. To be born well.
2. To be secure in the home.
3. To be well housed.
4. To be well fed.
5. To be guided in his personality growth.
6. To have good daily care.
7. To be protected against disease.
8. To receive proper treatment for his handicaps or illness.
9. To learn to protect his own health.

The parents were warned to seek guidance from teachers, principals local health department, Home Demonstration Agents, and Farm Agents, physicians and others who might be in position to help them with the health problems of their children. Miss Kenion closed her speech by asking parents and teachers to which gang do you belong?

1. The man who knows and knows not that he knows is asleep - wake him.
2. The man that knows not and thinks that he knows is a fool - slum him.
3. The man who knows not and knows that he doesn't know is a child - teach him.
4. The man who knows and knows that he knows is a King - hear him.

Miss Kenion asked each person to find his place in the four classifications, she said that she hoped we were among the last two groups.

She stressed unity of effort and cooperation. Miss Kenion has studied at Atlanta U., also Health Education at North Carolina College.

life, in promoting better living among our people.

Health Education and guidance is urgently needed.

The president thanked the association for their whole-hearted cooperation and asked them to continue in the work to be done. He stressed the importance of carrying out the resolutions adopted by the State body - A few are herewith stated: 1. More adequate buildings and equipment for all school children within the State and especially for the Negro children who have suffered from present overcrowded conditions in the class rooms, libraries, laboratories, etc.

2. The establishment throughout the State of more vocational training and shop work facilities to supplement the present set of ill equipped shops in the best school communities and no shops in most other communities. 3. Establishment of equality of educational opportunities for all children throughout the State. 4. That schools throughout the State be mobilized into a great program for raising the deplorable health conditions existing in the State of North Carolina.

5. That great is the responsibility for the equipment of schools, moral of the teachers and training of our children shall be assumed by the parents and teachers and expressed through the local P. T. A.'s working with principals and teachers the P. T. A. should seek to represent the will of the people to the board of education. 6. That

their Congress go on record as strongly urging the appointment of a supervisor of schools in each administrative unit where needed within the State. Mr. Martin is wide awake and interested in the work of the P. T. A. Both meetings were interesting and helpful.

We wish to commend Mrs. M. L. Turner, Supervisor of Colored schools of Duplin County, for her untiring efforts and accomplishment in the work with the schools of the county.
