Sansone - Herring Vows Are Spoken

In a ceremony of beauty and simplicity which took place at half after three o'clock on Sunday afternoon, November 2, in the Warsaw Baptist Church, Miss Mary Elizabeth Herring, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Macon Herring, Sr., became the bride of Mr. Anthony Sansone, son of Mrs. Antonette Sansone Perniciaro and the late Mr. J. Tall floor baskets of white chrysanthemums and pom poms and arrangements of feather bush were placed on the rostrum before a background of fern. Branched candelabra were used in profusion to complete the setting for the double ring ceremony, which was performed by the bride's pastor, the Rev. G. Van Stephens.

A program of nuptial music was presented by Mrs. Glendora Brown prior to the ceremony. Her selections included "Nocturne" by Chopin; "Veneration Love Song" by Nevins; Bach-Gounod's "Ave Maria" and during the ceremony Mrs. Brown softly played "Meditation" by Massenet. Mrs. G. Van Stephens, soloist, sang Greig's "I Love Thee". The traditional wedding marches were used.

The bride, who was given in marriage by her father, wore a gown of ivory slipper satin fashioned with a yoke of marquisette, outlined with seed pearls and buttoned in the back with miniature satin covered buttons. The full sleeves ending in points over the wrist were also outlined with seed pearls. The hooped skirt fell in a graceful chapel train at the back and a satin and net coronet held the fingertip veil of illusion. The bride's bouquet was of white roses and carnations centered with a purple-throated orchid.
