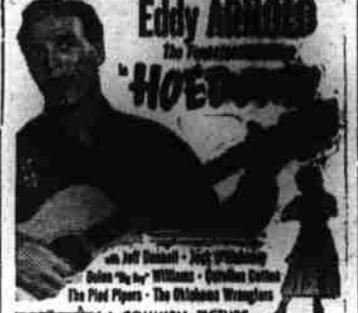

## EAST CAROLINA SINGING CONVENTION BE HELD MAY 27

Wilson, May 15 — Voices were being tuned up in North Carolina today. It's almost time for the big event of the year.

The 9th annual Eastern Carolina Singing convention is scheduled here Sunday, May 27.

The event will be held this year in Wilson's Municipal stadium. Last year more than 12,000 persons attended the day long convention as spectators and participants.

The Wilson Jaycees sponsor the presentation of the convention. However, the singing convention has an organization of its own headed by L. A. Hagwood of Newport News, Va. He will be in active command when singers begin their presentations at the convention.

The convention starts that Sunday morning at 10 o'clock, lasting until late afternoon.

The annual voice presentations have attracted thousands of persons to Wilson over the years that they have been in existence.

Hagwood will direct the actual singing. He has had more than 25 years of experience in directing gospel music in North Carolina and other states. He received his music training in the Moody School of Music in Chicago, Ill.

Working along with Hagood in the convention work are A. E. Denton, convention secretary from Smithfield, and Johnnie Woodall, convention vice-president also from Smithfield.

Serving as Jaycee chairman of the convention will be Robert E. Kirkland, Jr. of Wilson.
