The home was ensuite for the occasion and attractively decorated. Assisting in serving were Rev. and Mrs. A. L. Brown. There were 30 members of the Sunday School

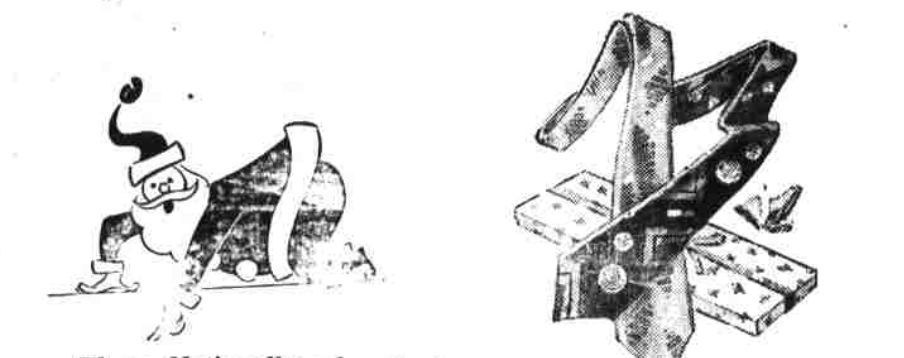

Local Native Bags Huge Black Bear
