## Wildlife Food Packets Scarce

Only a few of the 3,600 ten pound packets of seeds for wildlife plant-

ings remain to be distributed, Clyde P. Patton, Executive Director of the Wildlife Resources Commission, announced today.

As one of the Commission's projects for restoring wildlife food and cover, packets of mixed annual seeds have been distributed to farmers throughout the state who agree to cooperate with the wildlife program in planting the seed mixtures in odd corners of land and along field borders to provide food for rabbits, quail, and other small game species. The remaining seed packets will be sent out free of

charge to applicants on a first-come-first-serve basis.
