

## Area Meeting Of Southern Pulpwood Conservation Association June 5-6

Atlanta, Ga., May 19, 1952—The area meeting of the Southern Pulpwood Conservation Association covering the states of Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee and part of South Carolina is being held June 5-6 at the George Vanderbilt Hotel, Asheville, North Carolina, according to H. J. Malsberger, Forester for the Association with headquarters in Atlanta, Georgia.

'All the area meetings,' Malsberger states, 'will emphasize the need of having a well planned and continuous tree planting program

throughout the South.' Some estimates indicate as much as 18 million acres need planting in the South. 'At the present rate of planting,' Malsberger continues, 'it will take 78 years to complete the job. This is much too slow.'

A field trip for an inspection of the pulpwood thinning on the Biltmore Forest made by The Champion Paper and Fibre Company will commence at 1 p. m. Thursday, June 5, assembling at the George Vanderbilt Hotel. The banquet at the hotel that night will be presided over by W. J. Damtoft of The Champion Paper & Fibre Co., and the principal speaker will be Robert B. Robertson, Chairman of the Board of that company. Mr. Robertson will discuss the need for a full conservation program reaching small landowners and his remarks on this subject have made him one of the recognized forest leaders in the South.

R. C. Barlenbrock of The Mead Corporation, Kingsport, Tenn., will preside at the Friday morning meeting in the George Vanderbilt Hotel. J. H. Keener will describe in detail the Champion's conservation program in east Tennessee and North Carolina. Fred H. Claridge, State Forester of North Carolina, will outline that state's forestry program. W. M. Browne, Asst. Dir. of the Wood Procurement Dept. of Camp Mfg. Co., Franklin, Va., will describe his company's conservation program in Virginia. Rufus Page, former employee of the Forestry Department of North Carolina and now with Turrell & Morgan, pulpwood dealers in North Carolina, will describe the aids offered by that company to small landowners.

### Desires of Family Influence Design Of New Furniture

An American family's desire for "informal practicability" is one of the strongest influences on contemporary furniture design. That term is used by a leading furniture designer, Ernest Swartz of Rockford, Ill., who says he strives for informal practicability and furniture that is light in scale. In general, the aims of Mr. Swartz and other designers are livability, practicality, warmth, good taste, functionalism, sound construction, and moderate price. California designer John Keal

emphasizes that a home must be a place for relaxation. Warmth and a hand-crafted look can be adapted to contemporary furniture, he says.

Simple, non-ornate treatment is characteristic of the best modern furniture styling. An unostentatious look of luxury is imparted by hardwood veneers, one of the principal technical resources that designers have.

Wood veneers are cut from selected domestic and foreign logs. The men who "open" logs are specialists trained to decide how a log should be cut to reveal the most beautiful grain. Because of the thinness of wood veneer, adjacent sheets have matching grain figures. By the way in which the furniture designer arranges these, he can create the exact pattern he wants.
