Byron Dalrymple has made what he says is 'one of the most unusual discoveries in the angling world.' When he saw some of Michigan's most dyed-in-the-wool trout fishermen get all excited about another fish in the middle of the trout season, he thought he'd better investigate. The fish? The very common lake herring (really a cisco).

Just who tied the first fly that fooled the first herring no one will ever know. But the first actor in this little drama is the May fly. The thousands of miles of shallow shore lines of the Great Lakes have always been the greatest May-fly breeding ground in the continent. In the spring and early summer untold billions of them pop up. The herring, normally a deep water fish, swarm shoreward to gorge themselves on the flies. The movement has nothing to do with spawning, since they spawn in the fall, chiefly in November.

One day in the last ten years or so, somebody decided to offer the herring an artificial May fly. Dalrymple describes the strike this way. A streak of streamlined silver burst out of the water, leaped with dazzling airborne acrobatics. It fellwalked the water like a small-mouth bass, raced with trout speed, dived and evorated and in general fought stubborn, gamy rings around anything its own size wearing fins.

It's a sweet new sport from many angles. The rankst dubs with the most elemental tackle gets strikes, simply because there are so many fish. There's no wading necessary. Since the peak of the inshore herring migration usually occurs in June, it coincides with the great tourist migration. This has helped touch off the boom for herring. When a man sees dozens of local enthusiasts and tourists who've beaten him to the draw happily lashing the water, how can he forego such temptation?

The big problem, and the angle of this sport that separates the experts from the dubs, is the tender mouth of the herring. You don't haul these babies in. They insist that you play them, and that means with the utmost daintiness and until they are absolutely done in. It's

Power Company Bids For New Industries

Accenting its efforts to bring new industry to its service area, Carolina Power & Light Company has made industrial and agricultural development a full-time job under direct supervision of a vice president.

The announcement was made today by Louis V. Sutton, president of CP&L. He said S. Paul Vecker, a vice president, will devote his efforts toward securing new industries.

Full responsibility for sales activity of the company were shifted to Hugh G. Isley, the general sales manager. The company wishes to place greater emphasis on its efforts to bring new industries into the enlarged area in the Carolinas, consisting of approximately 30,000 square miles, which the company now serves, Sutton said in a letter to all department heads. Nitrogen from Solution Nitrogen and Anhydrous Ammonia cost about one half as much as from Nitrate of Soda. It is in liquid form, therefore, it has not been used extensively by farmers because of the problems of storing and distributing.

Arrangements have been made for Dr. E. R. Collins, Extension Agronomy Specialist from State College, to come to Duplin County and conduct two demonstrations on applying those materials.

The first meeting will be held on Herman Taylor's farm two (2) miles east of Bowden, at 9:00 a.m. on Wednesday, May 28.

Another meeting will be held on full charge of our sales department and its activities and will report direct to the president of the company.

C. C. McMillan's farm just east of Teachey, at 10:45 a.m. the same date, Wednesday, May 28.

This is the first of those materials to be used in the county. If we learn how to use them they may save the farmers a lot of money.

At the two demonstrations on May 28, the value of Anhydrous Ammonium and Solution Nitrogen will be explained, characteristics of the materials, types of equipment for applying, and comparative value with other nitrogen fertilizers will be discussed.

A few rows of corn will be fertilized with both of the solutions and a few rows with the nitrogen being used by the farmer this year.

Yield will be measured in the fall. These demonstration meetings should be of interest to every farmer in the county seeking to cut down on fertilizer cost. Every one is invited.
