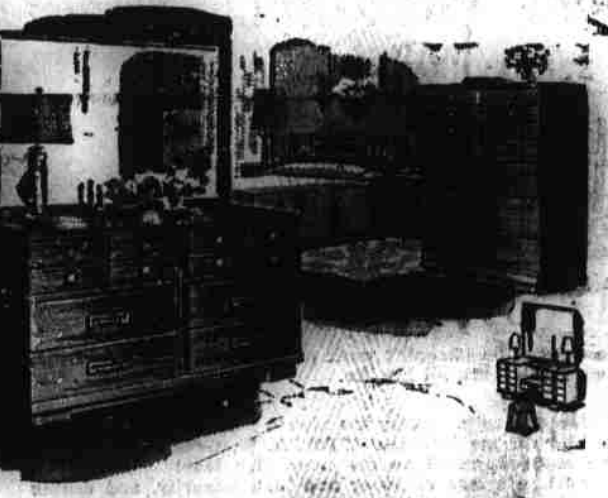

Facts About Passage Of County Government Laws Of 1951

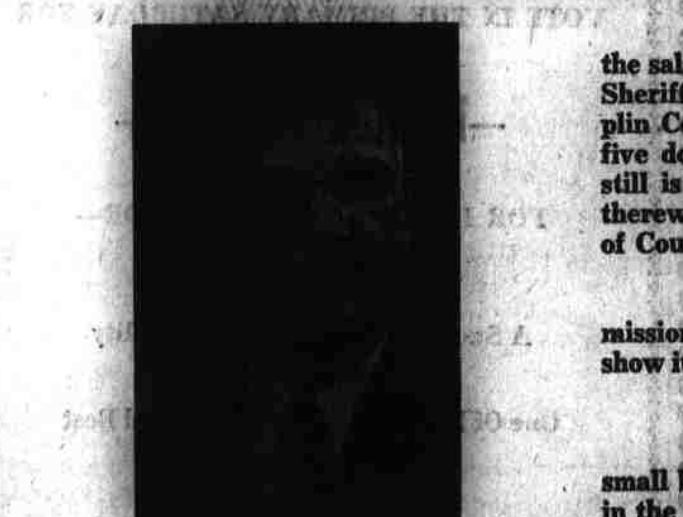
Prior to the passage of Chap. 114 Session Laws of 1951 Court costs in Duplin County were the highest of any County in the State. Citizens of the County pay Court Cost.

In reducing Court costs the Solicitor's Fee in General County Court was reduced to \$4 in any misdemeanor case, and no Jury Fee was to be charged unless a Jury was present in Court.

Before this bill was enacted a Stenographer's Fee was charged in General County Court when no Stenographer's service was offered. The Board of County Commissioners requested this to be eliminated by Statute.

Before the passage of Chap. 114 Session Laws of 1951 the Sheriff and his Deputies received salaries and fees. Under this law all fees go to the County. The Sheriff is ex-officio County Treasurer and in consideration of this, his salary was set at \$9.59 more per month than it had been, this being agreeable with the County Commissioners, and his monthly salary under the bill was \$350 plus \$175 travel allowance, he furnishing all expenses.

Half Fees paid to officers by the County are \$3,208.75 less, this fiscal year than they were the last fiscal year. This is a direct saving to the tax payer. This Act went into effect on March 1, 1951.



Section 15 of the Act reads as follows: "That in addition to the salary and travel allowed hereunder, the Sheriff, or any Deputy Sheriff, Constable, and any other law enforcement officers of Duplin County shall be entitled to and shall receive a fee of twenty-five dollars for seizing and destroying a whiskey still when such still is seized and destroyed and the arrest is made in connection therewith and conviction had." This was requested by the Board of County Commissioners. All of the above was presented to me by the County Commissioners and signed. If any one wants to see this I'll be glad to show it to you. I feel that Courts should be run for Justice instead of money. As to 30c Fees for serving subpoenas, if this is deemed too small by the County Commissioners, I will be glad to correct same in the next General Assembly if elected. I have always stood for and worked for better public education and will continue to do so. Your Vote, Support and Influence will be greatly appreciated.
