

Tobacco Allotments One-third of all of the flue-cured tobacco allotments in the state are of two acres or less, according to H. D. Goofrey Administrative Officer of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee In fact, there are 33,523 tobacco farms in the state with an allot ment of 1 1-2 acres or less, he said As far as the larger allotments are concerned, only 2-10 of one percent of the farms in this state have al-

lotments of over 50 acres.
Greene and Pitt counties lead the state with the highest average per farm. The average tobacco farm in Greene County carries an allotment of 13 acres while the average farm in Pitt carries an allotment of 12 acres. The other extreme for counties in this state with an appreciable number of allotments shows Wilkes and Iredell counties with an average of two acres.

How does Duplin compare? Of the 1987 tobacco farms in the county about 43.4 per cent have an allotment of 2,00 or less. There are 1,353 with 1,50 acres or less. Eightysix percent of the farms in Duplin have allotments of 5.00 or less while ourteen percent are 5.01 or more. We have only two farms in the county with an allotment of over fifty acres. The average tobacco

Tobacco farming is definitely a family enterprise in this county and in the state. Tobacco allotments for 1957 have been cut only slightly from what they were in 1940. Fo example, a four-acre tobacco allot ment in 1940, after applying increases in 1941, 1944, 1946, 1949, and 1951 and the decreases in 1947, 1948, 1953 1955 and 1956 would end up with ar allotment of four acres in 1956, Af ter the 1957 cut of 20 percent the allotment would be 3,2 acres.

This illustration shows that when demand calls for more tobacco, al-lotments have been increased and when the supply has been too great, allotments have been decreas-ed. This works to the farmers advantage by guaranteeing him sigher support price.
