New Programs Thru National Guard Says Capt. Bostic

New programs for fulfilling a mil-itary obligation, including an op-porunity for a young man to complete his ready reserve military service in three and a half years, are now available to men who enlist in the National Guard. Captain Richard S. Bostic, Battery

Commander of Battery B 150th AAA Bn (90mm Gun) North Carolina National Guard of Beulaville announce ed that the following plans are av-ailable to National Guard enlistees. Men between the ages of 17-18 1-2 may enlist in an Army National Guard Unit, take six months of Ac-tive Duty training with the Army and return home to serve for a period of three years in their local units. They are deferred from induction as long as they perform satisfactory service with the National Guard, and at the end of the 3 years they will be eligible for transfer to the Standby reserve and subject to a call for active Federal Service only in an emergency declared by Congress. In the standby reserve they are not required to participate in any reserve training. Young men between the ages of 17-18 1-2 who enlist in the National

Guard after April 1, 1957 will be required to take a minimum of 11 weeks of training with the Active Army. Individuals who take only the 11 week training will be required to serve in the ready reserve (Local National Guard Unit) until age 28. A man in this category is also deferred from induction as explained above.

Men over age 18 1-2 and under 26 who enlist in the National Guard after April 1, 1957, if they have had no prior military Service, must nad no prior military Service, must take the six months of Active duty and then serve the remainder of their six year ready reserve obliga-tion in their local National Guard Unit. Men in this group will be ad-ministratively delayed from induction so long as they participate sat-isfactorily with their Guard Unit.
