Beulaville's Betty Lou Hall Is Overall Winner In Senior Division, Southeastern District Science Fair Held At Wilmington

Beulaville's Betty Lou Hall, a senior at the Beulaville High School, was named overall winner in the Senior Division of the Southeastern District Science Fair at Wilmington College Saturday April 6th.

She was awarded a \$200 two-year scholarship to Wilmington College for her exhibit "Project Mouse", a study of the effects of radio-active calcium on a mouse.

As winner of the biological category, senior division, she was awarded a medical dictionary.

Other winners in the biological division were: Bay McDowell, Beulaville; John Sherill, Acme-Delco; Gilmer Ange, Jacksonville; and Betty Lou Williams, Beulaville.

Curtis Davis of Fayetteville, a substitute entry from his school, took first place in the senior division, physical science for his exhibit on "Amplitude Modulated Light Transmission." He was awarded a chemical index.

Other winners in the senior division, physical science were Lynn Jackson, Beulaville; Dee Clark, Beulaville; Peter Pedrotti, Fayetteville; and Tad Cherry, also of Fayetteville.

All the winners of the senior division of the science fair, will compete in the State fair in Raleigh later this month.

New Hanover County students took top honors in both the physical and biological categories of the Junior Division, L. H. Adcock, science fair director said.

Named over-all junior winner, and first-place winner in the biological category, was Lyle Hedman of Lake Forest, Junior High School.

He received a chemistry set donated by the Eastern North Carolina section of the American Chemical Society and a first-place gold medal.

The Junior Division prizes were a gold first-place medal, silver medal for second place and bronze medal for third place.
