Farmer's Tax Agent's Office Guide At Co.
Interested persons may secure a copy of the Farmer's Tax Guide by calling or visiting the County Farm Agent's office. This guide contains information on the filing of Income and Self-Employment (Social Security) tax returns for the year 1957.
These tax returns are due on or before February 15 (unless an estimate is filed by January 15, in which case the final return is due April 15).
This Farmers Tax Guide should be helpful to persons who assist others in filing tax returns or to farmers who file their own.
Farm operators who employ farm workers are required to file for these farm workers if a worker received as much as \$150 during the year or worked 20 or more days for cash wages.
These returns (Form 943) should be filed by January 31.
A limited number of the forms needed for filing are available for distribution from the Farm Agent's office to farmers who may not have received copies through the mail.

Politics
There is no anticipation of opposition for veteran Clerk of Court R. V. Wells. He should have it easy, as should Coroner Kennedy of Wallace for his post. It is generally unusual for an election to get by without at least one or two races. The sea is calm just now but one can see the waves beginning to develop at a distance.

Wallace Textile Plant Enlarging
J. P. Stevens and Co., Inc. today announced a major expansion of the plant at Wallace.
H. C. Carter, vice president, said a 50,000 foot addition has begun that will give the plant, upon completion, a total floor space of 255,000 square feet.
He said 20,000 square feet will be used for re-arranging machinery and the remainder for shipping and warehouse area.
The textile plant, largest in Duplin County, employs 530 people, 93 per cent of whom are natives of the Wallace area. Annual payroll is in excess of \$1,500,000.
Carter said no increase in employment is anticipated under the present expansion, that the addition will provide warehouse space previously rented away from the plant.
He said that while conditions in the textile industry do not justify capital improvements, the management "has so much faith in the future and in this community that it was decided to go ahead with the project."

He is now a member of the Duplin County Board of Elections which position he will be forced to resign before the November election as his name will appear on the ticket at that time as one of the State's Presidential Electors.
