**Chief Yeaman Bostic Commended**

Chief Yeoman Norman E. Bostic was recently commended by R. E. Pugsley in Norfolk prior to his retirement into the Fleet Reserve after completing twenty years of Naval Service.

Chief Bostic, who joined the navy in 1940 as a dundersent his basic training here, reported aboard ResSta in November, 1957. He finished his last two years of service as Captain's Yeoman.

During World War II, Bostic saw action in the Pacific aboard the carrier, USS Wasp and in the Atlantic aboard the USS Phillips, D. E. 133. While serving aboard the Phillips, Bostic along with his shipmates received the Presidential Unit Citation for capturing the German U-Boat 505.

Upon his retirement, the veteran chief, his wife, the former Virginia Miller and their son, William, plan to make their home in Norfolk, Va. Mr. Bostic is the son of Mr. Ed. Bostic of Warsaw.


