The new and modern First National Bank of Wallace opened on Wednesday evening when open house was held. Miss Judy Lynn Klippel of Ashboro, the reigning Miss North Carolina, cut the ribbons, officially opening the doors of the new building to the public as a highlight of the program.

Gordon Sanderson, assistant vice president and manager of the Wallace Bank, introduced local dignitaries as well as members of the bank staff and members of the Board of Directors of the First National Bank. Among the officials present were Exec. vice president, M. F. Allen, Jr. who was cashier of Waccamaw Bank and Trust Company in Kenansville for several years, and Wilma Q. Rivenbark, cashier, who worked in the Kenansville Bank for a number of years.

A tour of the bank was made by all guests. First National Bank first located in Wallace in temporary quarters on East Boney Street, which was inadequate. Its new location is on the corner of N. College and East Southerland Streets, across from the A&P Store in Wallace.

The new structure was designed and constructed simply but features every possible convenience for the customer and the employee. The building was constructed by the New River Management Company of Jacksonville and designed by Leif Valand and Associates, architects

Tobacco Plants Available
According to information received today from V. H. Reynolds, County Farm Agent, tobacco plants are available in Georgia. Reynolds received a letter from J. Harold Brown, County Agent in Moultrie, Georgia stating that the farmers in Georgia had just finished setting their tobacco and have plenty of plants left. These plants will be available for the next ten days. Reynolds will be happy to refer names to farmers needing plants.

The building is equipped with sound proofing and adjacent to the lobby is the bank's office. In that area, the floor is carpeted with modern fire-proof Acrylic green carpet.

The bookkeeping department is placed conveniently and will be able to take care of several years' expansion.

The vault which joins the lobby area has a new modern door with time clocks. The clocks are set for a definite time and the vault cannot be opened until that time.

Also for the employees is a small Eichenette fully equipped.

The First National Bank is equipped with a drive-in teller window.

The teller window has proven very popular for transacting bank business in a hurry. It also saves time for the bank in making transactions can be taken care of in a minimum of time.

Sanderson extends a cordial invitation to all residents of Duplin County to visit the bank and look over all of the modern facilities.

The new First National Bank was open for business to the public on Thursday.

Band Uniform Drive Goes Into Full Swing Committee Named, Begin Action Tues.

The James Kenan School District will begin a Band Uniform Drive on Tuesday evening May 31. The goal for the drive will be \$5,000.00 with community quotas as follows: Magnolia \$800.00 Kenansville \$1200.00 and Warsaw \$3,000.00.

An announcement letter and brochure of the band has been mailed to the homes giving the information of the drive and the newly established band. Soliciting letters have been secured and will go into the boxes during next week.

The James Kenan District Band, under the direction of Mr. Sinclair Newman Jr. has some seventy members to date with over one hundred interested students for next year. The District Band Committee, and The Band Patrons Club is seeking to purchase 75 uniforms at a cost of about \$50.00 each. Any additional funds raised will be used for larger instruments which will be necessary before the band moves

into grade two music. The uniform will be of black 14 ounce whipcord, trimmed in gold, with doubled breasted coat and air force style cap. Funds must be on hand before the order is placed.

Liquor Making In Duplin Given Jolt

The number of liquor stills destroyed in Duplin County this year does not compare with the total destroyed in 1959, but the volume of still capacity eliminated has increased, according to Sheriff Ralph Miller.

In 1959, for example, Duplin Sheriff's Office destroyed 74 honor stills. To date in 1960, only 23 stills have been destroyed.

However, in two stills destroyed earlier this year, the maximum output equals what would have been the total output of all the stills destroyed in 1959.

At one of the stills on North Goshen Swamp in Faison Township, a still with a running capacity of 1,450 gallons with 40, 20-barrel capacity barrels was destroyed.

Then, on South Goshen Swamp in Glisson Township, a still was destroyed which had 70 of the 20-barrel containers used for holding mash with a capacity above 1,450 gallons.

Duplin Women Observe National Home Demonstration Club Week

Thirty-one Duplin County Home Demonstration Clubs will take part in the observance of National Home Demonstration Week May 1-7.

Mrs. Mae Spicer, Home Agent, said all of the Clubs are planning separate programs.

Today's home demonstration program takes into account that today's homemaker and her family face increasingly complex adjustments to the world around them.

Fast changing living patterns, family roles, and family relationships in the home and community are broadening the number and some of the problems confronting families. For this reason, educational services to meet the problems are in growing demand and fill an important widespread need.

Miss Ruth Current, assistant director for the N. C. Agricultural Extension Service, says that most women participating in the home demonstration program are trying to learn to live and work congenially with

others; to better use time, money, and energy to reach family goals; to choose food, clothing, home furnishings, household equipment and other essentials to attain a satisfactory way of life; to keep the household running smoothly; and to understand the relation of nutritious food, suitable clothing and adequate housing to the health and well-being of each family member.

D. S. Weaver, director of the N. C. Agricultural Extension Service, says, "One of the fine programs being emphasized at this time is the development of communities. Problems in connection with such projects emphasize the necessity of people learning to work together to accomplish goals that they cannot achieve as individuals or as families."

From May 1-7, 62,000 home demonstration club women will be equipping more people with the total Extension Service program and will emphasize its contribution to home and family living. Special recognition will be given to the annual program to benefit so many home makers annually.
