Do You Have Old Newspapers?

Yellowing newspapers lying forgotten throughout the State are the targets of a program sponsored jointly by the State Department of Archives and History and the North Carolina Library Association. The object is to uncover North Carolina newspapers not now available in libraries and research institutions.

The Department and the Library Association are working on a Union List of North Carolina Newspapers which will list the location of all North Carolina newspapers to 1900 known to exist. Since papers in possession of libraries in and out of the State have already been listed, a special effort is now being made to find rare newspapers in the hands of citizens of the State. Within the past month several have been reported, copies of which were not heretofore known to exist.

Persons having in their possession papers published prior to 1900 are urged to send to State Archivist H. G. Jones, P. O. Box 1881, Raleigh, a list of the titles, places of publication, and dates. The owner of these papers will then be listed in the new Union List.

Of particular interest to the program are the small, lesser known newspapers. Relatively complete files are available in libraries for the larger daily papers. However, even the larger papers should be reported so that they may be checked against the holding of the research institutions in the State.
