N. C. Baptist Hospital Offering Training Prog. Operating Room Tech.

North Carolina Baptist Hospital will become one of the eight hospitals in the United States and the first hospital in the Southeast to initiate a training program in operating room techniques under a plan announced today.

This new educational project of the hospital was made possible by a grant received from the Allstate Foundation of the Allstate Insurance Companies. A large portion of the nurses' expense while taking this training will be paid for by

sour, and St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester, Minnesota.

Officials of the Hospital said in announcing their plans that there is a strong need for graduate training for nurses in the state, but the opportunities are few. The program does not carry college credit, but it pointed toward the diploma graduate nurse with the idea of helping her to improve her abilities, and at the same time supply a technically trained person for the job that is largely unfilled throughout the state.

This does not preclude the nurse with a college degree from applying. They expressed the hope that this program will be the forerunner of others so that more nurses will have the chance to develop advanced skills in special areas of their profession.

This first course will begin May 1 and continue for six months. It will offer on the job experience in each of the surgical specialties and special seminars and lectures concerning the care of patients. The student will learn operating room technique, recovery room procedure, and care of post-operative patients. When the six months are completed, she will receive a certificate stating that she has served in the Hospital's operating room for the period.

The Foundation is operated to assist cultural, charitable, and educational efforts. It has headquarters at 222 South Church Street in Charlotte, North Carolina, with Arthur M. Eisenhart as district director. Recently, it made a grant to provide scholarships for student and graduate nurses and to aid in the recruiting of student nurses.
