Crane Reminds Farmers Of Federal Law On Child Labor Requirements In Work

State Labor Commissioner Frank Crane today reminded Tar Heel farmers and commercial growers who are hiring workers for spring planting and harvesting that Federal law prohibits children under 16 years of age from working on farms during school hours.

Commissioner Crane said that under the Federal Wage and Hour Law (Fair Labor Standards Act), children of any age may do farm work before or after school hours, on week ends, or on holidays.

Crane also stated that farm children working exclusively for their parents or guardians are exempt from the Federal child labor requirements.

"The child labor provisions apply equally to local children and to migrants," Commissioner Crane added. "However, migrant children under 16 may be employed in the spring if the school they last attended is closed for the summer, even though schools may still be open in the area where they have moved to work."

Crane said the farmer may best protect himself from unintentional violation of the Federal law by requiring from each young person he employs during school hours an age certificate showing he is at least 16. These certificates, which serve as proof of age under the law, may be obtained from Superintendents of Public Welfare.

ATOMIC POWER SITE-Construction is well underway at Port, S. C., on the Southeast's first atomic power plant being built by Carolina's Virginia Nuclear Power Association composed of Carolina Power & Light Company, Duke Power Company, South Carolina Electric & Gas and Virginia Electric and Power. The circular structure in the center will house the reactor which will manufacture steam to turn a turbine-generator in the steam-electric plant of far left. Ground was broken in October, 1950, and the reactor will go "critical" in 1952.
