SENATOR ERVIN SAYS:

Presidential Inauguration And Berlin Crisis Greatest Influence On Congress

Presidential Inauguration... The brief interlude between Christmas and the New Year, we have a national pastime of reflecting on events of the year, which I shall pursue in this column. The 87th Congress opened January 3 -- 17 days prior to the inauguration of the 35th President. Its principal activity during that time was to pave the way for the incoming administration. In my judgment, the two events which had the greatest influence on the 87th Congress were the inauguration of President Kennedy on January 20 and the Berlin Crisis, which reached its peak in July: the passage of a good man of the President's key legislative proposals demonstrated a good working relationship between the executive and Legislative Branches of the Government during the past session. At the same time, there was a long and vigorous fight over foreign aid authorization and appropriation bills, which characterized the fundamental independence of the two branches of Government. Moreover there were a number of controversial measures proposed to Congress which were shelved for the session. These included the aid programs for education and medical care, which may be considered anew during the forthcoming session. Although the Reorganization Act of 1949 stated that Congress should adjourn on or before July 31 of each year, again this year Congress was in an extraling session which brought adjournment on September 27. One of my individual senatorial problems this year came over administrations. Patronage nominations caused long hours of work in my office during most of the year.

Grain Aeration System Throughout Southeast Studied

Storable grain can be aerated satisfactorily by several methods according to a report from the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Tests of aeration systems, some commercially installed and others, designed and installed for research studies, were made in the Southeast in flat and upright storage bins of steel and concrete.

The report discusses such factors as airflow rate, kind of grain, and manual and automatic control of fans.

It points out the value of aeration in cooling stored grain, equalizing the grain temperature, removing storage odors, applying fumigants, and preventing mold growth and insect activity. It also tells how to vary operating schedules to suit daily and seasonal atmospheric conditions during the four seasons of the year.

This study was conducted by the Agricultural Marketing Service as part of its program of research aimed at reducing costs of marketing farm products. Holding down reflected in price benefits to both the producer and the consumer.

Nation's Mailmen Are Potent Force In March of Dimes Disease Battle

A small, yellow envelope serving as a harbinger of an expanding war on crippling disease arrives in the mailboxes of 40 million American families this week. It brings the "mailer" of the 1962 March of Dimes, now dedicated to seeking the answers to birth defects and arthritis while continuing its work in polio. Printed on each envelope is the confident prophecy, "Your Dimes Will Do It Again!"

Addressed by tens of thousands of volunteers in the county chapters of the National Foundation—March of Dimes across the nation, this symbol of scientific research and total medical care for the victims of these diseases promises immediate help and future hope through the generosity of the American people. The prediction on the mailer, "Your Dimes Will Do It Again!" is a reference, of course, to development of the Salk anti-polio vaccine and to the later Sabin oral vaccine. Both were made possible, as were the medical care and rehabilitation of many of those paralyzed by polio, by public contributions to the March of Dimes. Many millions of the dollars so well used to bring about these achievements came to local chapters through similar mailers in years past.

Recipients of these mailers, including those in distant Hawaii and Alaska, were urged by March of Dimes leaders this week to return the mailers to local chapters as promptly as possible. As one chapter chairman said: "Aside from financial resources needed urgently for research and for total medical care of victims, The National Foundation—March of Dimes must expand its already existing national work of chapters stricken by birth defects or by arthritis. "The figures give you an idea of the appalling magnitude of the problem. Each year in this country, at least 250,000 infants are born with significant birth defects and 21,000 die. This we must prevent.

As to rheumatoid arthritis, fully 30,000 children and adolescents are crippled. Altogether, more than 11 million Americans suffer from the arthritic diseases. This must not happen in the future. "When we say to the public that 'Your Dimes Will Do It Again!' it's not an empty boast. We mean precisely that. Some folks believed that the answer to polio would never be found. But our scientists never abandoned hope and, because of March of Dimes contributions from those who believed as we did, the answer was found. Tens of thousands of lives have been saved since then, and tens of thousands saved from crippling. "None of us, scientists included, knows when the answers will be found to birth defects and arthritis. We just know, as we knew with confidence before the Salk vaccine, that those answers will be found provided sufficient public support is forthcoming."

Lassiter is a graduate of Murray State College, Murray, Kentucky. He holds an M. A. from Georgia Peabody College, Nashville, Tennessee. He has taken courses in rehabilitation at New York University, the University of Georgia, and the University of Florida. He has a background of experience in the health agency field and has served as a Trustee of the Florida Society for Crippled Children and Adults.

Lassiter is a veteran of World War II and served under Admiral Chester W. Nimitz in the Pacific area. He is married and has four children.
