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Coastal Construction Company Awarded Contract For Phase 3, Onslow H. S.

ROSE HILL, N. C. — It has been reported by Gerald Carr that the Coastal Construction Company, of Rose Hill, was awarded contract on December 12, amounting to \$465,000, for Phase 3 of Onslow High School. Work began January 8, with the concrete foundation and concrete columns of the one-story building. The entire job is expected to be completed by September. Concrete masonry, steel and window wall will be used in the construction, which will provide 52,000 square feet. It will consist of classrooms, gym, and auditorium. Unusual features of this project are the concrete concourse between buildings, exterior white concrete columns and fascia beams and 6" high porcelain enamel fascia around the auditorium.

There will be 35 men at work with 15 carpenters, masons and masons helpers being hired during construction, under project superintendent Earl N. Baker, of Jacksonville, N. C.
L. N. Boney, of Wilmington, is the Architect.

Rural Community Growth Improved

The full resources of the Farmers Home Administration are being mobilized to aid rural areas suffering from low-income and underemployment, B. A. Parker, Jr., County supervisor for Farmers Home Administration said today. He said Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman has assigned top priority status to the rural areas development program and has named the Farmers Home Administration as the agency to coordinate USDA technical services in support of rural community development.
The rural areas development program is concerned with the plight of the nation's underemployed people - families who don't earn enough from farming or other work to obtain an adequate living. The plight of these people has caused growing concern in recent years and has received the active attention of Government leaders in the past several months.
The program offers a low-income rural area, help in strengthening its economy.
"A revitalization of the rural economy and a full development and utilization of the rural community's human and natural resources will help the entire nation," Mr. Parker said.
"It will help the large urban areas by cutting down on the forced migration of rural people to already overcrowded cities."
"It will help rural areas by knocking out economic stagnation and erasing the chronic problem of rural poverty. A well planned, well organized rural areas development program will stimulate the economy of the area by bringing in new industries, restraining the unemployed for new jobs and helping communities assess their wealth of undeveloped resources."

Farmers Home Administration personnel are well prepared for rural development work according to Mr. Parker, in as much as the agency has been concerned with helping low-income farm people ever since it was organized in the depression ridden thirties.
Mr. Parker listed the following aids which his agency is providing to rural development areas:
(a) A wide range of housing, water development, farm operating, and farm real estate loans; some services also available to rural residents in communities up to 2,500 in population.
(b) Personal farm and money management assistance to borrowers so that loan funds are used to the best advantage.
(c) Credit counseling, with families not using the agency's service but needing advice in handling their financial problems.
(d) Technical assistance to the rural areas development committees in preparing and carrying out their community development plans.
The Farmers Home Administration carries out its federal program in North Carolina through 66 county offices strategically located so that its services are available to all farmers who need assistance.
