## County Garden Leaders Plan Garden Contest

The Duplin County Garden leaders met Wednesday night at the E. E. Smith School in Kenansville with Ed Powers of Wallace Presiding. The meeting was held to further plan the garden contest. Fitzhugh Newton of Wallace, appearing on the program, pointed out how more gardeners could be involved. Mrs. Dorothy Wallace of Warsaw in reviewing last year contest, told the group that 15 communities took part in the contest, as compared with 13 in 1960.

Also 465 gardens were judged by local leaders. The net worth of these gardens was estimated at \$161,520 according to County agent R. R. Wilkins. Mrs. Ina Everett of R. 2, Mt. Olive, who shares the 1961 championship with Newton of Wallace discussed the benefit of having a family garden. Mrs. Everett facetiously added "even the chicken and hogs ate better."

The leaders decided that neighborhood garden tours would be made in conjunction with the judging. T. V. Flowers, Horticulture specialist for the N. C. Extension Service will be asked to judge the top ten gardens in order to select the champion garden.

Mrs. Alice L. Lee, Home Economics Agent, emphasized that the family garden should be comprised of fifteen or more vegetables, and should include five or more green or leafy vegetables such as collards, mustard, kale, Garden peas, snap beans. Three or more yellow vegetables, such as carrots, yellow corn, pumpkins, yellow squash, and sweet potatoes. Three or more vegetable high in vitamin C, such as tomatoes, cabbage, lettuce, watermelons, green pepper, strawberries, and cantaloupes and four or more of such vegetables as Irish potato,

toes, cucumbers, beets, field peas, Lima Beans, onions, radishes, cauliflower, eggplant and turnips. Wilkins gave a slide review of last years contest. J. B. Harris assistant summed up the meeting in this manner after listening to expressions of why people won't grow gardens. "He that regardeth not a good garden earns the right to hunger."



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
