Jones a cook in the battalion's Company B in Ludwigsburg, entered the Army last August, and completed basic training at Fort Jackson, S. C.

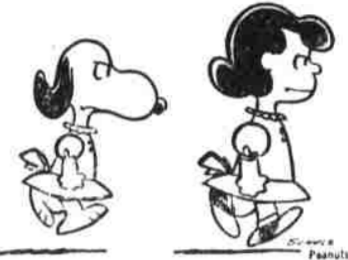
He attended Mount Olive High School. His mother, Mrs. Carrie M. Jones, lives in Goldsboro.

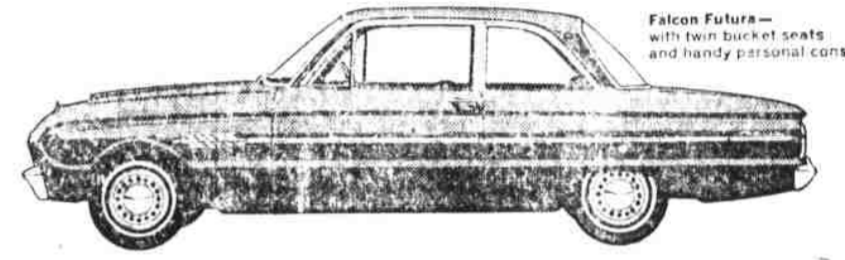
the United States Air Force technical training course for missile facilities electrical specialists at Sheppard AFB, Tex.
