# Rural Areas Development

A program aimed at bringing more income into Eastern North Carolina is getting underway. The Rural Areas Development Program combines the efforts and initiative of local citizens with the resources of State and Federal agencies to bring more job opportunities into the area. The program offers help to any rural community to create more local employment and increase its agricultural, industrial, and recreational potential.

County Area and State committees are being formed to develop a planned program of action. County Extension Agents are helping organize merchants, farmers, bankers, and many other groups into an effective working force. These committees prepare an Overall Economic Development Program for the area. This is a long-range plan describing the resources of the marketing area, the problems and plans for improving the economic conditions in this area.

Farmers Home Administration County Supervisors are reviewing instructions for developing an OSD-P. Local committees can turn to him for this assistance.  
Already the program has served as a stimulus to bring industrial payrolls into rural areas, create markets for agricultural products that can best serve an area larger than a single county and aided in training trade schools and hospital facilities to serve the people in a group of counties. Additional information on the program can be obtained by contacting County Agricultural Agent or Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor.

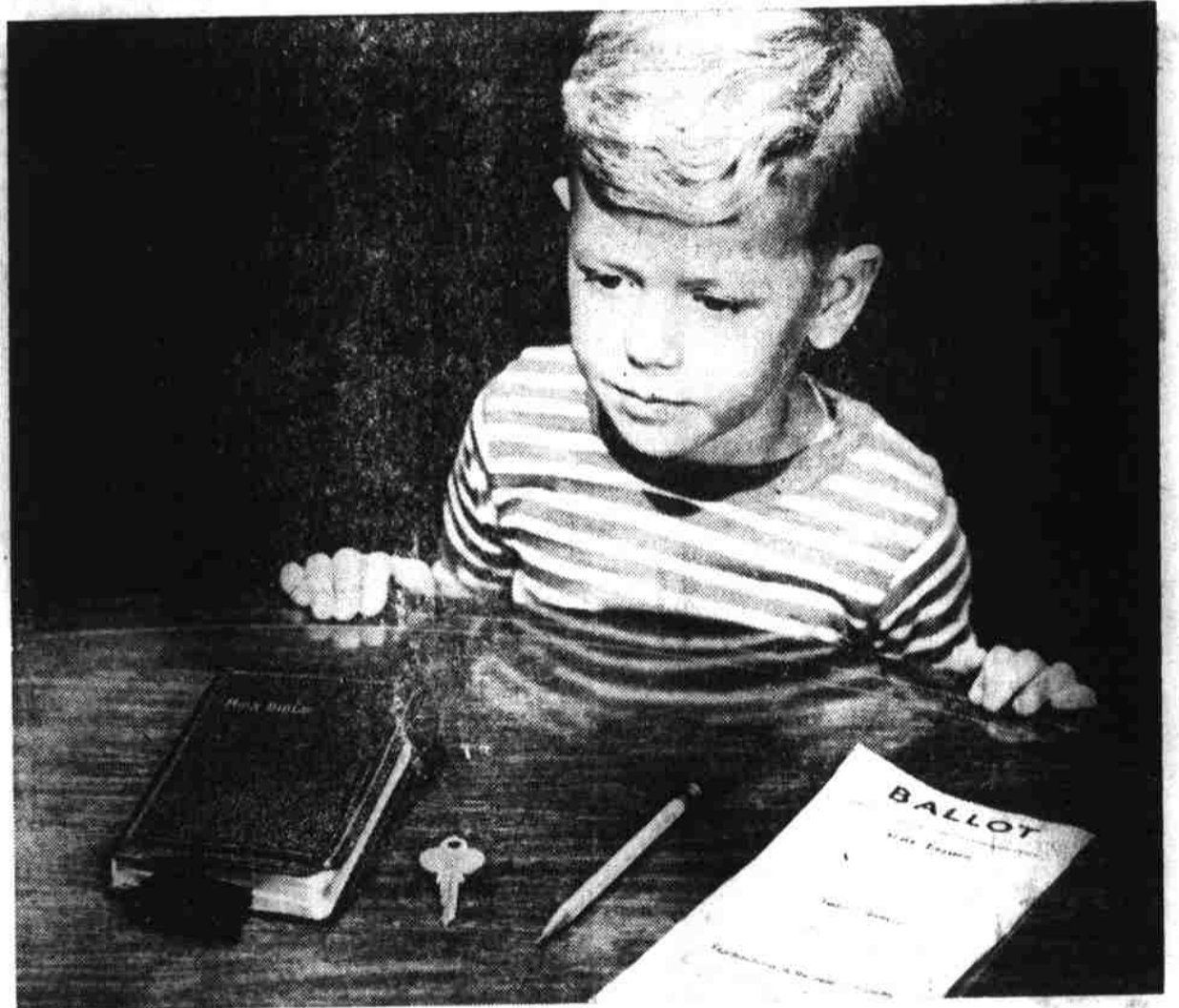
