FORMER REGISTER OF DEEDS

Albert Outlaw Buried Tues.; Gave Much To Co.

Albert T. Outlaw, 67, died at his home in Kenansville Sunday morning after a lingering illness. He was a native of Duplin County and had worked in the Register of Deeds office since age 14. He was sworn in as Register of Deeds in 1932 and served until 1953 when he resigned because of failing health.

Funeral services were held from the Grove Presbyterian Church, Tuesday at 3:30 P. M. by his pastor, Rev. J. Richard Holsinger and was assisted by Rev. Lauren R. Sharpe, pastor of Kenansville Baptist Church.

He is survived by his wife the former Carolyn Garrison of Greenville, S. C., one daughter Mrs. Sarah Johnson of Hickory, one son Albert T. Jr. of Bristol, Va., one brother Rev. A. H. Outlaw Elizabeth City; two sisters Mrs. Hampton Baker and Mrs. Joel Kennedy of Beulaville.

Interment was in Golden Grove Cemetery.

During his lifetime, Albert Outlaw made a tremendous contribution to Duplin County, never seeking any recognition for himself for the unselfish service he rendered the people.

It was through his tireless efforts of researching the records of Duplin that the Duplin Story evolved. He did the great majority

of the historical research which went into the authentic story of Duplin written and produced by Sam Byrd in 1949-50.

Not many citizens are aware of the fact that he is responsible for the many historical monuments which have been erected throughout Duplin. He secured the information and proof of the events which are now marked to make this possible.

Although there has never been a County Historian in an official capacity, one can easily say that Albert Outlaw was just this. If he had a hobby it was the history of Duplin and her people. Most of his nights were spent in the vaults of the Court House searching records.

Over the years, most of the information has been published in The Duplin Times.

In recognition of the great service Albert Outlaw rendered Duplin County as Register of Deeds, Judge Henry A. Grady presented a portrait of him to the County which hangs in the County Court House.

He was born in Albertson Township and reared in Beulaville. His education was in Duplin public schools and the School of Hard Knocks.

Throughout his life, he was active in the Democratic Party. He was a member of St. John's Lodge No. 18 of the Masonic order of Grove Presbyterian Church in Kenansville. For many years he served as secretary of the Grady-Outlaw Clan.

Albert Outlaw will be missed in Duplin County. Although he was confined to his home and bed for the latter part of his life, he remained mentally alert and always expressing an interest in Duplin County, her citizens, and her future. For he believed in Duplin County as a leader among Counties with courageous people.

Duplin Educator, Hugh Wells Buried Monday

Hugh McAden Wells, 59, of Rt. 1, Pink Hill, died Saturday night in Duplin General Hospital at Kenansville.

An educator, he was retired principal of B. F. Grady School in Duplin County and had served as principal of Rose Hill, Magnolia and Chiquapien high schools. He taught at Godwin, Wallace and Teachey before becoming a principal.

Wells was born in Duplin County, a son of the late Lucian A. and Josephine Ward Wells. He was a member and elder of Teachey Presbyterian Church; teacher of a Sunday School class at Smith's Chapel Presbyterian Church; a member of St. John's Masonic Lodge 113 at Kenansville and of the Woodmen of the World.

He was a former president of the North Carolina Principals Association and of the District Principals Association; former clerk of the Session, Teachey Presbyterian Church, and a graduate of Teachey High School, Westminster Prep School and Davidson College and attended Harvard University.

98 Duplin Farmers Get Certificates For Attending Hog Production School

Ninety-eight Duplin County farmers were presented certificates of attendance Monday night at the final session of the eight-course Swine Production Course held in Duplin over the past eight weeks.

Farmers receiving certificates were required to attend at least six classes. Fifty-seven farmers attended all eight sessions.

Jim Bunce, Assistant Farm Agent, said the average attendance for the school was 130, with the highest single night attendance being 155 and the lowest attendance being 107.

Grover Dobbins, Southeastern District Agricultural Agent, presented the certificates. He told those attending that "hog business and farming in general are changing very rapidly," he added, "if it works today, then it's obsolete. What we know today about hog farming and farming is not good enough for tomorrow."

Vernon Reynolds, Duplin Farm Agent, told farmers that they should produce on their farms as much grain as possible if they are in a hog production program and that an all out effort should be made to get as high yields as possible through the use of hybrid seed corn and recommended fertilization. He pointed out that if corn has to be purchased farmers should purchase

it during the fall at harvest in order to get corn for as cheap a price as possible.

Farmers were advised that 80 per cent of the cost of hog production is in feed and it becomes increasingly important that as much grain as possible be grown on the farm.

Reynolds said, "These eight weeks of classes is just the beginning of the hog program in Duplin designed to increase farm income from hog production by \$2,000,000. Ralph Sasser and Jim Bunce are available at any time to assist all farmers who are interested in carrying out a hog production operation. For that matter, the Farm Agent's office is always interested in helping farmers with any program which the farmer desires to put in or improve."

The reason; it has been determined that the new name is more general and appropriate, since this organization serves all farmers of the County irrespective of locality.

The first year's operation was 1934 with a loan volume of \$64,000. Its peak loan volume in 1961 was \$5,190,118.68. The number of farmer members now total 2464 Duplin farmers now own \$637,245. stock in

the organization. The farmers completely own this, their own credit institution.

The policies of the Association have been broadened to make loans for any and all purposes desired by farmers with terms ranging from one to seven years.
