The Panthers hit 19 out of 23 shots from the free throw line. Charlie Lanier and Ricky Thomas led the Panthers with 16 points each. Jerry Simpson scored 13, and Rusty Lanier and Ricky Simpson had 7 apiece. L. D. Smith paced Topsail with 17 and Morris Andrews second with 16.

In the second game on Wednesday night the Midway Raiders edged Swansboro 52-51 in a come from behind thriller. The Sampson County Champs were trailing 40-35 in the final quarter but Eld Dudley led Midway to the front by one as the game ended. The Jackson boys (Bobby and Billy) hit 14 and 11 respectively for the winners. Ernest Wiggins lead Swansboro with 14 points. Jim Corbett had 13 and Jim Pate 12 for the Onslow County Champs.

In the third game of the playoffs New Hope, Wayne County Conference Champions, dropped Contentnea 73-51, behind the shooting of Stanley Keel. Keel, the big gun in New Hope's lineup, scored 24 points while Harold Brooks paced the losers with 18.

### Rita Sumner Selected To Participate In East-West All Star Basketball Team

Rita Sumner, outstanding basketball player, of Beulaville High School has been picked by the area basketball coaches to participate in the East-West Girls All-Star Basketball game at Forest City on March 17.

Rita has played first team forward on the girls basketball team of Beulaville High School for the past four years. She was the tennis leading scorer last year, and she led the team in scoring this past season with a 25 point per game average. This was an outstanding accomplishment in view of the fact that she sat out at least half of many games. Rita led her team to 19-1 record this year, the team winning the Duplin County conference and tournament championships.

The popular senior, who is also a majorette and an outstanding student, left for the game March 15. She will be accompanied on her trip by Addie Sue Horne, another outstanding Beulaville forward.

According to Treasury figures, Duplin County citizens have purchased \$8,427,370 in U. S. Savings Bonds.

Hawkins stressed the fact that both E and H Series bonds now pay 3 3/4 per cent interest. If held to maturity, the E bond matures in seven years and 9 months, while the H, a current income bond, is a 10 year certificate. Both bonds have been extended an additional 10 years beyond maturity, at the same rate of interest - - 3 3/4 per cent, simple interest.

Holdings of both the E and H bonds need not do anything to have their bonds extended - the procedure is automatic.

The annual limit for the purchase of H bonds has been recently increased to \$20,000 for the calendar year. The Series E limit remains at \$10,000 a year.

The speaker pointed out that as of March 1, the cash value of outstanding E and H Bonds set a new record of \$44.7 billion, up \$69 million since the end of January.

riotic service to the nation in the United States Savings Bonds program."

In making the presentation, Hawkins read a message from Secretary Dillon noting the importance of the Savings Bonds program as it relates to the national debt and the general economy. The message cited bonds as the surest way of backing military strength.

Dillon passed on an accolade to the banks and other issuing agents by stating that "You who sell U. S. Savings Bonds are performing a public service of high order. You're contributing to our national strength by improving our system of debt management and thus helping to prevent inflation."

All banks in Duplin County and elsewhere sell bonds as a public service to the purchaser and the U. S. Treasury, according to Hawkins. He stated further that more than 80 per cent of all Savings Bonds are issued by banks.

The speaker stated that the sale of E and H Series Bonds are generally on the increase throughout the state and nation, and Duplin County sales are about on a par with the average. Sales for 1961 were \$240,811 as against a quota of \$237,360, or a 161.4 per cent of realization.
