The County Board of Equalization and Review, composed of the Board of County Commissioners, met on Monday, March 13, pursuant to the Machinery Act, to equalize the valuation of all property in the county. These were heard on March 20 and 22.

Representatives of the Southern Appraisal Company, and the County-wide assessors were present during the hearings.

The board shall, on request, hear all and all taxpayers who own or control taxable property assessed for taxation in the county in respect to the valuation of such property or the property of others.

Thirty-nine persons have made requests to be heard by the County Board of Equalization and Review.
