Fonville, Robert Blackburn, center fielder, and Rocky Planchard, third baseman. Fonville, one of the most outstanding Little Leaguers in this area set the pace for Warsaw getting three-for-three. Blackburn, one of the best pitchers in the league came up with two-for-three. Planchard was outstanding in the play off down at the hot corner with two great plays.

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Garden Time

I visited friends in the upper Piedmont several weeks ago. During the visit the man of the house wanted me to see his grapevines and tell him "how to control the 'Mexican' bean beetles" which are eating the leaves. I knew that the Mexican bean beetle, to my knowledge, never attacked grapevines so my curiosity was aroused.

As I suspected he had a ravenous colony of adult Japanese beetles and they were doing their usual thorough job of consuming the foliage.

The Japanese beetle is attractive and easily identified by the metallic green color and coppery wing covers. It is about one-half inch long.

Because the beetle has become so widespread in North Carolina, the state was placed under federal quarantine in 1962. Dr.

H. Farrier, entomologist, quotes Dr. Cynthia Westcott as follows: "Another horrible example of an introduced pest which has cost untold millions of dollars because of a lack of a little money and prompt eradication measures when it was first discovered."

Control of this insect is now a problem for all citizens of North Carolina. The beetles attack many plants and prompt and effective control measures must be employed if we are to hold them in check.

While several insecticides are recommended for the control of the adult Japanese beetle I believe I would use Sevin because it is both safe and effective. Safe on crops because there is no residual time limit between the application of the spray or dust and eating the product. Careful experiments have proven Sevin to be effective in the control of many insects, including this beetle.

Sevin may be applied as a 1 per cent dust or as a spray. If the spray is used, add 1 1/2 tablespoons of 50 per cent wettable powder to one gallon of water. Do a thorough job of spraying.
