FLUE-CURED TOBACCO STABILIZATION

Following is a part of the report of the General Manager of Flue-Cured Tobacco Cooperative Stabilization Corporation dealing with the outlook on stabilization's operations in the future.

Of the 224 million pounds of tobacco sold during the past fiscal year, 88 million pounds, valued at \$40 million, representing 31% of total sales, moved under the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Barter program. The outlook for continued substantial quantities of tobacco being moved under the Barter program is not favorable. Indications now are that only a very small quantity will be bartered during this fiscal year. This indication, along with recent adverse attacks from a health standpoint, does not appear encouraging for an increase in sales.

The Export Payment Program for tobacco (more commonly referred to as "Section 32") became effective February 16, 1962, and has resulted in a movement of 7.5 million pounds of flue-cured tobacco through June 14. This program provides for a 20% reduction from the current price schedule for tobacco moving into foreign channels of trade. It is not applicable to tobacco used domestically. Stabilization receives full credit for the tobacco at its current sales price and

STABILIZATION STOCKS

Public Law 496 continues to be a strong factor in the volume of tobacco being sold throughout the world. Since the beginning of this program in 1955, through December 31, a total of 237 million pounds of flue-cured tobacco, valued at \$173 million, has been exported. This program has had a strong influence on the market. By Congressional action last year, this law was extended to December 31, 1964. Under existing conditions, it is reasonable to assume that if the 1963 Crop compares favorably to either the 1960 or 1961 Crops, Stabilization's receipts this year will exceed the quantity received from the 1961 Crops.
