Simmons To Attend Campaign Conf.

RALEIGH - LeRoy G. Simmons of Albemarle, Democratic candidate for North Carolina Senate, has been invited to attend the first Campaign Conference for candidates to be held in Raleigh on September 7.

In announcing the invitation, State Party Chairman Bert Bennett stated that the candidates will be briefed by state officials and department heads on various key subjects such as taxes, budget, revenue, education, roads, industrial and agricultural development. It is anticipated that each subject will be followed by a question and answer period.

Bennett stated that the session will begin at 9 a. m. and conclude around 4 p. m. The candidates have been invited to a luncheon at the Mansion by Governor Sanford.

In preparation for the session which will be held at the Hall at the House, Bennett has asked each candidate to return a questionnaire suggesting subjects and particular areas that should be discussed. He stated that each candidate will also be provided with a kit containing detailed factual information on subject not planned for discussion as well as those to appear on the agenda. Basic information on statewide campaign plans will also be included.

"Many of our candidates are running for office for the first time," Bennett said, "and are not so familiar with the many facets of state government as the veteran legislators. It is felt that this conference, or friends who have confidence in him the remaining funds," the President declared. He also called attention to the practice of many banks in providing easy to attain education loans.

The First Baptist Church, Greensboro, will be host to the annual Sunday School Convention of the Baptist State Convention, September 10 and 11.

"Outreach for the Unreached, Spearhead for Missions" will be the theme for the convention. Dr. Rogers Smith, administrative assistant of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board, Richmond, Virginia, will stress the role of the Sunday school in missions around the world.

Sanders, Louisville, Kentucky; Dr. Wayne Dehoney, Jackson, Tennessee; Robert Dowdy, Glynn Hill, and Helen Young, Nashville, Tennessee; Mrs. George McClelland, Lebanon, Missouri; and Mrs. David Lee, Silver Springs, Maryland.

Dr. Edward McDowell, Dr. Denton Coker, and Dr. Ben Fisher, all of Southeastern Seminary, will speak at various sessions.

Dr. Douglas M. Branch, Dr. Earle Bradley, Dr. William Smith, O. J. Haeger, Tom Greene, and the state Sunday School staff will represent the Baptist State Convention of

North Carolina. Emphasis will be placed on medical, visual aids, church libraries, church kindergartens, church recreation, new teaching techniques, and efficient administrative procedures. Help will be available for workers with all age groups. Special interest conferences will be conducted. More than 40 outstanding Sunday school specialists will appear during the two days of conferences and inspirational meetings.

The Rev. S. C. Ray, minister of education, First Baptist Church, Greensboro, is in charge of the arrangements. Dr. Herman, secretary of the Sunday School Department, will serve as convention director.

Jeff B. Wilson, a trucking industry official, will speak to the Wallace Rotary Club at a regular meeting to be held on September 6.

Wilson is a native of Eastern Carolina and attended Durham High School, New York University and Wake Forest College. He was Past District Governor and now International Counselor of Lions International, and was past N. C. Director of Highway Safety.

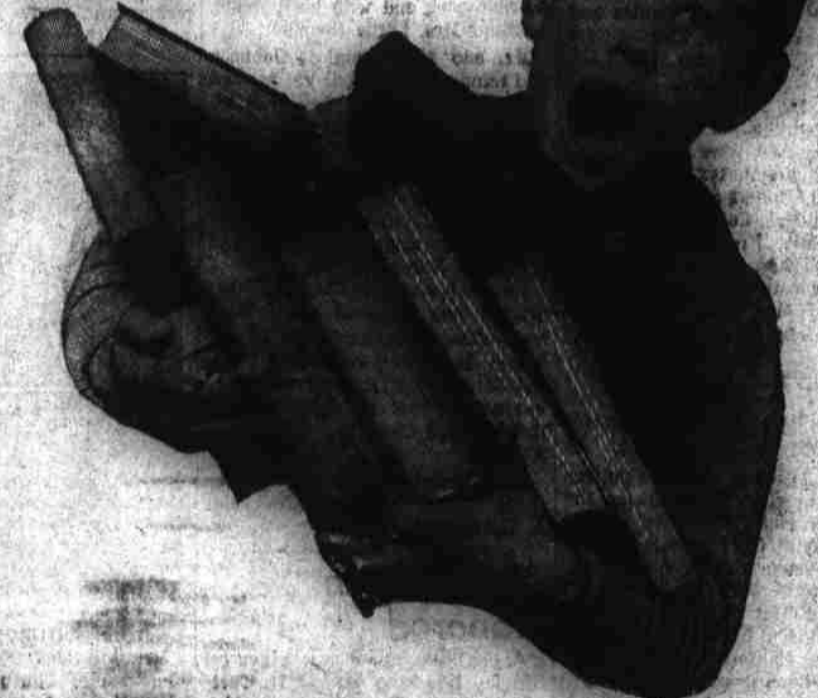
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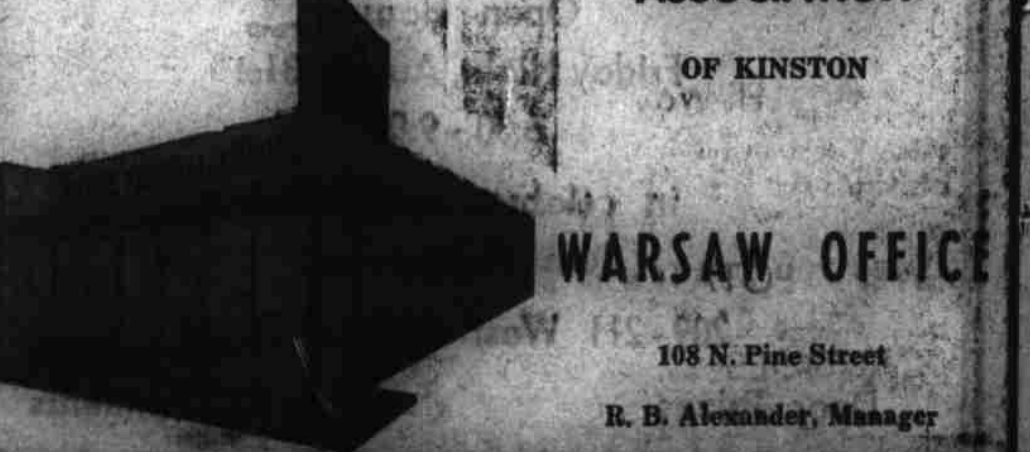
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
