I have sufficient pre-ginning equipment to remove most of the trash and dirt before the cotton goes through the gin stand. Gin saw teeth will chew up trash into small pepper trash which is impossible to remove without excessive waste of lint and damage to the cotton. I have also adequate heat which will be controlled in order to give a better quality of cotton.

I am using the very heaviest grade of cotton bagging and new cotton ties which will give you more weight.

My gin is located 1 mlie south of Clinton on Highway 421 near Hgihway 701.

I will operate the gin and give service each night as long as necessary.
