During the business session, plans were made to wash cars at Emmett Herring's on September 29 beginning at 1:00 o'clock. The proceeds will be donated to the 4-H program.

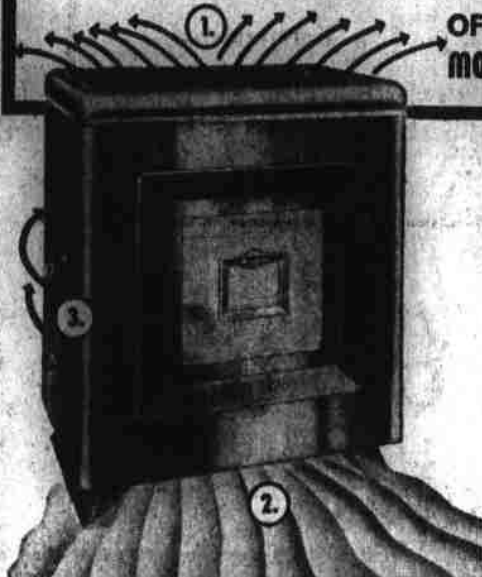
Announce Birth
