Civil Service

A new examination for Geologist has been announced by the U. S. Civil Service Commission for filling positions paying \$5,335 and \$6,345 a year, mainly in the Geological Survey of the Department of the Interior throughout the United States. Positions in the Bureau of Mines and the Bureau of Land Management may also be filled.
To qualify, applicants must pass a written test and have completed pertinent college study or a combination of such study and professional experience. Details on the requirements to be met are given in civil service announcement No. 288 B.

Applications will be accepted until December 4, 1962, and must be filed with the Executive Secretary, Board of United States Civil Service Examiners, Geological Survey, Department of the Interior, Washington 25, D. C.
Civil service examination announcements and application forms may be obtained from many post offices throughout the country or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C.
