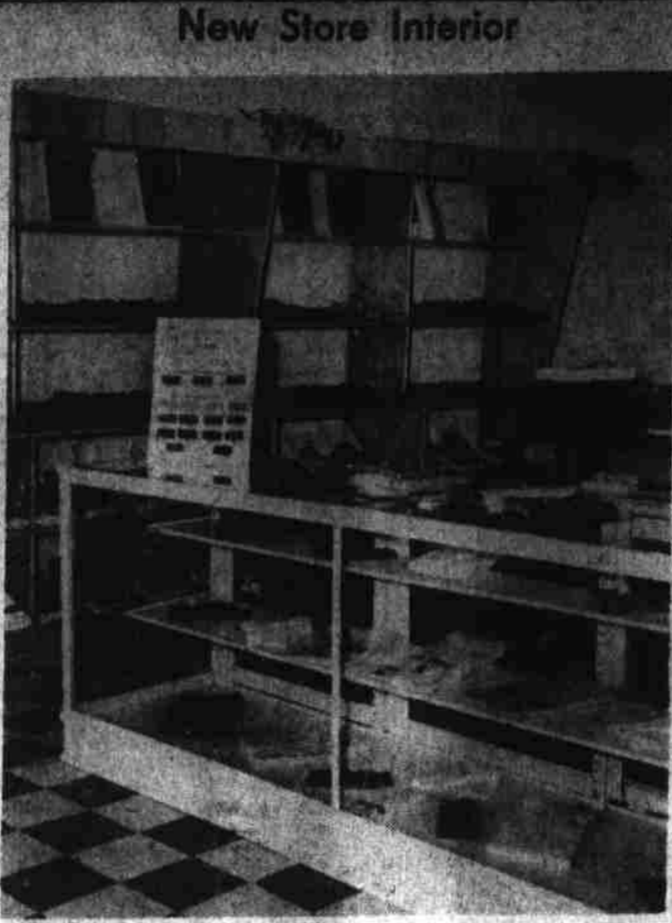
New Officer Preside At PTA
