Of this total, some \$3.7 mil-lion was paid to employees of the diversified textile firm in July and August, he said. Bonuses paid last Christmas totaled \$2.4 million.

Over 50,000 employees at Burlington plants in 16 states receive the payments, with the individual amounts depending

individual amounts depending on length of service. The bonuses are paid in ad-dition to benefits provided by Burlington's Profit Sharing Retirement Plan for non-sal-aried employees. Members of the plan, in 1964, had approxi-mately \$5.2 million to their accounts which was emural-




