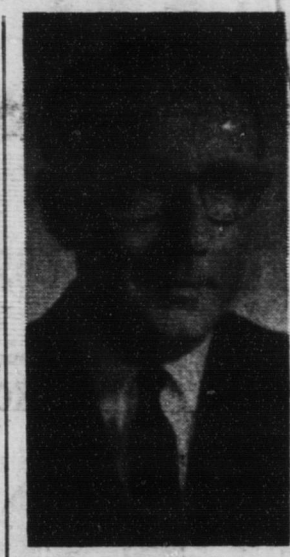
### Mocksville Woman Injured

### Training For Forestry Technician

Beginning in September 1965, Wayne Technical Institute will offer an 18 month Forestry Program leading to an Associate in Applied Science Degree. Graduates of the Wayne Tech program will be qualified for employment with the United States Department of Agriculture Forestry Service, North Carolina State Forestry Service, Pulp and Paper Companies, Lumber Companies, and private land owners.

Tuition for the 18 month course at Wayne Technical Institute is only \$30.00 per quarter or \$180.00 for the entire program. Reid Folsom, formerly on the staff of Lake City Forestry School, will be the instructor.

In the first 6 months of this year Savings Bonds sales in North Carolina amounted to \$26,277,340, which is 49.5 per cent of the state's annual quota of \$53,100,000.

Led by Hyde County which achieved 104 percent of its annual quota, 37 counties in the state have achieved 50 percent or more of their goal for this year through June.

Savings Bonds sold during June in Davie County amounted to \$14,509, according to Knox Johnstone, Davie County Volunteer Chairman. Cumulative Bond sales in the county for the first half of the year totaled \$159,256. This is 69.7 percent of the County's goal of \$228,330 for 1965.

State-wide sales of Series E Bonds in the first half of the year showed an increase of three-tenths of 1 percent but were off by one-half of 1 percent during June.

Series H Bond sales showed a decline for the year of 25 percent but showed a sharp increase of 74 percent during June.

On Friday, the Exhibitors' Party will be held at the Blowing Rock Country Club from 8 P. M. until 12 midnight. The party will feature cocktails, a buffet dinner and dancing to the music of The Ambassadors.

The annual Horse Show Breakfast to be held at Mayview Manor on Saturday beginning at noon, is expected to attract an estimated 600 persons. The buffet breakfast will feature an array of exotic foods that will delight the choosiest gourmet.

The social events will be climaxed Saturday evening with the annual Horse Show Ball at Mayview Manor. Reservations for both the breakfast and the ball may be secured through the office at Mayview.

New York, N. Y., July 27, 1965 - Burlington Industries, Inc. today reported net sales of \$323,018,000 for the three months ended July 3, compared to \$301,180,000 for the similar quarter in 1964. Net earnings were \$16,393,000, against \$12,114,000 for the period last year.

Adjusted for the two-for-one stock split effective July 23, earnings for the quarter were equal to 65 cents per share, against 50 cents per share for the period a year ago. (Before adjustment for the stock split, per share earnings would be \$1.32, compared to 99 cents for the similar quarter last year.)

A quarterly dividend of 20 cents per share, based on shares outstanding after the stock split, was declared by the Burlington Board of Directors today, payable September 1 to stockholders of record August 20. The dividend is equivalent to 50 cents per share on shares outstanding prior to the stock split, and represents an increase of 25 per cent over the previous quarterly dividend.

Burlington's net earnings for the nine months ended July 3 were \$50,570,000, compared to \$34,945,000 for the nine months last year. On a per share basis, adjusted for the stock split, earnings were \$2.06 for the nine months this year, compared to \$1.44 for the similar period in 1964.

Net sales for the current nine months were \$989,000,000, compared to sales of \$889,019,000 for the period last year.
