FRUIT AND NUT COFFEE LOAF

1/2 cup mixed candied fruit
1-3 cup chopped nuts
2 tablespoons light corn syrup
6 Brown 'N Serve Rolls
1-4 cup melted butter or margarine
Thin confectioners' sugar icing

1. Mix candied fruit, nuts and corn syrup. Split Brown 'N Serve Rolls to but not through bottom crust. Spoon candied fruit mixture into slits.

2. Arrange filled rolls in greased 9 x 5-inch loaf pan. Spoon any leftover filling over and around rolls. Drizzle with butter.
3. Bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.) about 15 minutes or until well-browned. Glaze with thin confectioners' sugar icing while warm. Garnish with additional fruits and nuts, if desired.
