Internal Revenue News

For more than a dozen years now, Internal Revenue has cooperated with North Carolina State University in conducting Income Tax courses for tax practitioners and others who assist taxpayers in preparing return. The program is managed and sponsored by N. C. State University.

On December 9, at the Raleigh School, Mr. Claude A. Kyle, Assistant Director of Internal Revenue's Southeast data processing center, will be the featured speaker. Mr. Kyle began his Internal Revenue career in 1948 as a revenue agent in Alabama and has held a variety of supervisory and managerial positions prior to his appointment to the Service Center position in Chamblee, Georgia, in 1962.

Again this year, the IRS will make available to the school a number of its experienced Internal Revenue agents to serve as instructors in the two and three-day schools.

Sessions will be held in Asheville (November 29-30); Charlotte (December 1-2); Greensboro (December 2-3); Greenville (December 6-7); and Raleigh (December 8-10). The total attendance at these schools usually averages 550.

North Carolinians who are interested in participating in these schools are asked to make application direct to: Dr. Eugene Starnes, Division of General Extension, N. C. State University, Box 5125, Raleigh, N. C.
