The first operation was in March, 1962, when the artery from his heart to his lungs and an enlarged heart valve were repaired. On May 19, the same incision, which required forty stitches, was re-opened in his chest and two holes in his heart and another heart valve were repaired and some tissue was taken from the lower right chamber.

The picture above was made by Jimmie's nurse while undergoing one of his many special electrocardiograms. This test required 2½ to 3 hours. Jimmie is in the fourth grade at school and with just a few restrictions, he goes about a normal life. He is glad to be back with his family and friends.
