Broyhill explained that he will be available on a regularly scheduled basis in each of the counties of the ninth District so that residents can discuss with him their views on legislative matters or problems they are encountering with the Federad government. No prior appointment is necessary. The series visits are being held on week-ends when the Congressional schedule in Washington permits.

This is the second series of formal office hours this year in keeping with Congressman Broyhill's long-standing practice of scheduling such sessions at last twice each year.


