

Burlington Industries Reviews Record 1966 Physical Year

Greensboro, N. C. -- Bur-lington Industries, Inc., com-pleted a fifth consecutive year of record sales and earnings during 1966, with sales reach ing an all-time high of \$1.37 billion, up 4.4 per cent over 1965, and net earnings up 12.4 per cent to \$77 million.

Charles F. Myers, Jr., Burlington president, states in the company's annual report now going to more than 32,000 shareholders, that the year also brought record capital spending of \$159 million to and modernize proexpand duction facilities.






